Reconstitute in 20mM Tris, 150mM NaCl (pH8.0) to a concentration of 0.1-1.0 mg/mL. Do not vortex.

[STORAGE AND STABILITY]

Storage: Avoid repeated freeze/thaw cycles.

Store at 2-8°C for one month.

Aliquot and store at -80°C for 12 months.

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Stability Test: The thermal stability is described by the loss rate. The loss rate was determined by accelerated thermal degradation test, that is, incubate the protein at 37°C for 48h, and no obvious degradation and precipitation were observed. The loss rate is less than 5% within the expiration date under appropriate storage condition.

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


Figure 1. The binding activity of BDNF with APP.

Brain-derived neurotrophic factor, also known as BDNF is a member of the neurotrophin family of growth factors, which are related to the canonical Nerve Growth Factor. BDNF acts on certain neurons of the central nervous system and the peripheral nervous system, helping to support the survival of existing neurons, and encourage the growth and differentiation of new neurons and synapses. Besides, Amyloid Precursor Protein (APP) has been identified as an interactor of BDNF, thus a binding ELISA assay was conducted to detect the interaction of recombinant rat BDNF and recombinant rat APP. Briefly, BDNF were diluted serially in PBS, with 0.01% BSA (pH 7.4). Duplicate samples of 100uL were then transferred to APP-coated microtiter wells and incubated for 2h at 37°C. Wells were washed with PBST and incubated for 1h with anti-BDNF pAb, then aspirated and washed 3 times. After incubation with HRP labelled secondary antibody, wells were aspirated and washed 3 times. With the addition of substrate solution, wells were incubated 15-25 minutes at 37°C. Finally, add 50µL stop solution to the wells and read at 450nm immediately. The binding activity of BDNF and APP was shown in Figure 1, and this effect was in a dose dependent manner.




Figure 2. SDS-PAGE

Sample: Active recombinant BDNF, Rat

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


Figure 3. Western Blot Sample: Recombinant BDNF, Rat; Antibody: Rabbit Anti-Rat BDNF Ab (PAA011Ra01)
